Urban Fellows Program

The Urban Fellows Program is an initiative of the Center for the Comparative Study of Metropolitan Growth in the College of Law. Top graduate students are selected from across Georgia State University and Georgia Tech's School of City and Regional Planning to study and discuss issues related to urban growth with top decision makers.

Program Requirements:

- <u>Lecture Series</u>: Distinguished speakers from academics, government, and the private sector talk about a variety of urban and environmental issues. Student interest helps direct the types of speakers we select.
 - o Afternoon lectures will be held approximately once per month (August through April) from 4-5:30 p.m. Lunch lectures will also be scheduled throughout the semester from 12-1 p.m.
 - Examples of the types of lectures we schedule: Atlanta Regional Commission updates; Atlanta Beltline updates; New City Start-Ups; City of Atlanta Strategic Community Investment Study; Future of MARTA; History of Atlanta
- <u>Community Service</u> Urban Fellows must perform 5 hours of community service per semester on a project of their choice.
- Mandatory Research Paper –All Urban Fellows must write a research paper of publishable quality on any urban, growth management, or environmental law and policy issue. Accepted Urban Fellows students will be registered for the course LAW 7494 for 1 credit in the fall semester, and 1 credit in the spring semester. This course satisfies the COL's writing requirement. In the fall semester, students will listen to lectures, select their research topic and advisor for their paper, and turn in an abstract and outline at the end of the semester. The research paper is due at the end of the spring semester.
